

SUITE III.

Allemande.

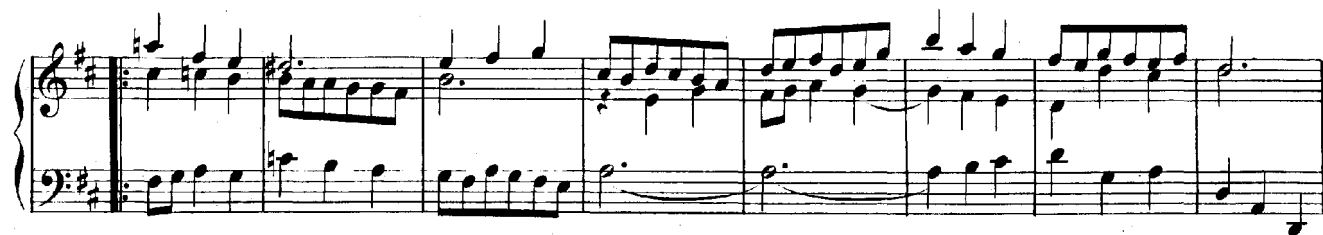
