

SUITE VI.

Allemande.

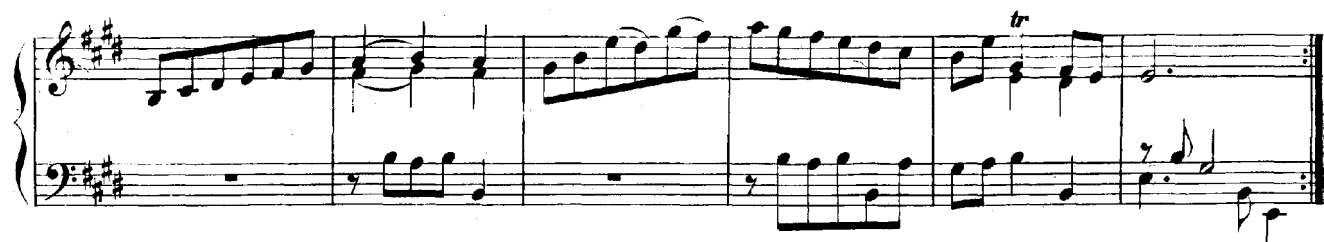
Gavotte.
